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
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Dear Friends,

Movie Review The King's Speech

There is a famous and moving speech delivered by King George VI during WWII. He closes it by urging the people of England to put their hand in God's hand and face the unknown, that in doing so their path would be more certain than taking a known way. I am sorry this film has no reference to that speech. But it does reveal the huge task a mere man, neither desiring nor feeling qualified for the task, takes on his shoulders anyway. He had a terrible speech impediment. Anyone who has never faced such an ordeal, has no idea the torture a person endures who suffers from such a struggle. I have encountered such people from time to time in our line of work, but none had faced as huge a task as a King, and a king in wartime. The inner wounds that fuel the outward impairment are more painfully faced than is the effort to speak. It takes the will of the king to humble himself as a man to receive real help from another man's friendship. As a study of the intricate and delicate issues of the heart that family relationships for good or evil produce, this film is a masterpiece. But the vulgar language makes it unsuitable for children and some adults.
