

STAR WARS

Really? Am I going to do a film review on Star Wars? If I do, will I admit it is out of sheer sentimental nostalgia on my part? No, I am serious. At this writing THE FORCE AWAKENS has taken in well over 1 billion dollars-the highest and fastest such income of any film in history. That's a lot of influence on a lot of imaginations. And though I will admit a brief shaft of nostalgic energy shooting through my post-adolescent soul, it is not the reason for this review. I became aware in the pre-film advertising of the increased muddy mixture regarding the force. In an add for a Star Wars related video game, there was this statement that defined the light side of the force as that which is for goodness, peace, and justice. The dark side was the source of strength among other aspects. This has always been suggested, but in the early films the dark was more clearly just dark. It was not openly suggested that the dark was where strength is found except in the minds of those already taken by the dark. But in this more blatant statement, the clear message is that if you want strength, go for the dark. In a world of disenfranchised fatherless ill-educated youth, this can be a dangerous message. Yes, that false message already comes via a thousand voices, but one this large and high profile telling youth that darkness is power is a force that needs to be met with greater force: the power of the Cross revealing the love of God.

Now of course the entire concept of the force is Eastern not Christian, and is full of lots of problems philosophically and theologically. I am not seeking to delve into all that here. Just a note of warning: this generation is starved for transcendence, for meaning, for heroes, and for true justice. It is a great opportunity for Christians to learn how to address this longing. But to be prepared, we must be educated enough to speak the language of this generation. It will NOT do to just say (as has been so often said by Church people); "Oh, the Force is false doctrine"- "Oh, Harry Potter is witchcraft" - "Oh, the Matrix is of the devil." I am working hard on a new series that will help us speak the needed language while magnifying the gospel, using the very stories of our current cultural mythology to do so.

Singing Scripture

It may seem like a strange way to begin the new year. After all, there are a million current events which may seem to demand top billing. But to kick off this new season, it seems wiser and better to focus on what is going on inside us rather than outside. Speaking of inside and outside, in the recent film INSIDE OUT, which deals with the inner mental and emotional processes of a young girl and her parents, there is a hilarious theme that runs through the film. It is that of a TV commercial jingle that erratically shows up from nowhere, often when least welcomed. We all know what that is like. And even better, you have memorized a lot of the Word of God simply by allowing these tunes to run through your consciousness. You will be memorizing without even making an effort to memorize.


Closing Thoughts... (Psalm 57: 7-11)

My heart is steadfast, O God, my heart is steadfast;


I will sing and make music.
