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Dear Friends,



You stiff-necked and uncircumcised in heart and ears, you always resist the Holy Ghost, as your fathers did, so do you. Which of the prophets have your fathers not persecuted?

Acts 7:51-52



Wow! What strong and direct words these are that were spoken by Stephen to the Sanhedrin prior to his stoning. I wonder if there were conversations about Stephen that went something like this? "He should have stayed with the simple gospel. He should not have gotten involved in Jewish politics." Or "If he had been kinder and gentler, he wouldn't have gotten himself killed!"

I have gone back and forth with myself on the issue of my own demeanor when responding (or reacting?) to various evils. I have come to the conclusion that going back and forth is the wisest way to respond. There are times when it is wise to be kind, gentle, a good listener, and a servant to my opponent. Yet there are other

times that call for more. Don't get me wrong. It is always right to be loving and never right to be hateful, to anyone. What we must discern is when it is right to focus on speaking the truth, even if it makes the hearer(s) uncomfortable. In God's mind, to be kind and loving and to speak truth for the sake of your opponent is the same thing. I don't ever need to stop and choose between being gentle and loving or boisterous and hateful. No, I may have to be controversial and loving though. Stephen was. Remember his final prayer before he died? "Lord, do not hold this sin against him." (Acts 7:60) It cost him his life. But he died with his soul intact!

It is sentimentality rather than love that compromises truth. It is a sort of religious sophistry (which political correctness slinks and slithers right into) which provides a cloak for cowardice. After all, we do not want to rock the boat! *Live, and let live* excuses us from standing for what is true and good. In the name of being what we think is kind and loving, it is possible we are affirming evil. And in affirming evil, are we not being the very opposite of kind and loving? For if we refuse to call evil what it is, we may be helping to condemn the

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one whom we claim to love. And if we speak hard clear truth, even strongly, because we care about truth, and even more to the point, love the people we are addressing, is that not truly loving?

Yes, I know we must be careful not to think of ourselves more highly than we should, and especially not to seek only to win the argument. I learned years ago that if I win the argument, I have probably lost the person. So what was won? But if my main objective is not to offend anyone and I water down the truth, what then is won? NOTHING. And I have lost a part of my own soul. I have compromised both truth and genuine love.

Can we all agree that we have entered a time now where it is vital that we speak the truth in love empowered by the Holy Spirit? The false message that 'good Christians don't get involved in political issues' was a damnable lie in 1930s Germany, and it is still a damnable lie. Sticking the label of politics on a topic in hopes of silencing Christians is just what the devil wants: the spreading of lies without any interference from them.

I am a Christian and a conservative. I am not a Republican. I support that party because it is obviously closer in platform to my core beliefs. But I have noticed over the years, those like myself, who affirm most of the Republican platform, make it loud and clear when some issue arises we do NOT support. When I disagree with them, I say so. When I believe they are very wrong, I strongly say so. But not so with those on the left. They seem to think that as Christians they can quietly slip past the truth test, and remain supportive of the Democrats, right or wrong. So they do not stand up against the many evils that party celebrates. And if you point out that obvious hypocrisy, they will prove that very hypocrisy by either angry rejection of truth, or silence smiles that affirm the evil. I believe this is a spirit. It is not about politics. It is about which Kingdom they are bowing to, and who is truly their Lord. If that sounds judgmental, so be it. Rather than point to my judgmentalism, answer the question. How can you as a disciple of Jesus affirm the platform of baby killers? Don't point to Republican hypocrisy, which is certainly there, but answer your own!

I'm preaching to the choir for the most part. I know that. But I believe we are entering the time we have all been wary of - where we must stand, and stand, and keep standing, no matter what it costs, for the truth of the gospel. And in order to be faithful to it, we will find we must also be faithful to the gospel in political arenas. For they are, and have always, been impossible to completely separate.
